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Gaylord Context

The Gaylord line began in France and in time emigrated to England, then British North America and the name ended with the marriage of (Joanna Gaylord (1653 – 1685). to John Porter (1651 – 1699) on December 16, 1685 in Hebron, Tolland Connecticut. The first gaylord in North America was William Gaylord who landed at Mattapan or Dorchester Massachusetts on the Mary and John on May 30, 1630. In 1635 some of the party journeyed to the Connecticut Valley and located at what today is Winsor Connecticut. Bringing their church with them. They were known by the faith they held, “Puritans”.

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He lived in Crewkerne, Somersetshire from 1619 to 1624 when three of his children Samuel, John and Joseph were baptized.

He was one of 140 passengers who sailed from Plymouth England on the ship Mary and John, commanded by Captain Squab on March 29, 1630. Other relatives on board included William Phelps², his wife six children and

brother George. Other individuals on board include Roger Clap.³⁴

They landed at Nantasket 9 (Hull) Massachusetts on May 30, 1630. They organized into a church and settled in Dorchester. He was admitted as Freeman on May 18, 1631 "Willm: Gallerd". Dorchester organized a town government and William took an active role in the town.

He moved to Windsor in 1638. He died on July 30, 1673 in Windsor, Hartford Connecticut.

The inventory of "the estate of Deacon William Gaylor who deceased July 20, 1673," was taken 2 August 1673 and totaled £296 17s. 6d., of which £230 was real estate: "his housing, homelot & pasture adjoining," £59; "16 acres of land in the Great Meadow," £80; "land on the east side of the Great River being 34 poles in breadth by the river," £68; "18 acres of land by Rocky Hill," £3; and "39 acres of land near Pine Meadow," £20.

SAMUEL GAYLORD

MIGRATIONS/RESIDENCES: Samuel Gaylord came to Dorchester, Massachusetts, in 1630 at the age of 10 on the ship *Mary & John*, with his parents, sister Elizabeth, age about 15, brothers William, 13, John, 8, and probably Walter about 4. The family relocated to Windsor, Connecticut, in 1638.¹ By 1684 Samuel had moved to Hatfield, Hampshire County, Massachusetts, where he died in 1689.²

PARENTAGE/FAMILY: Son of WILLIAM¹ GAYLORD (*GMB*)³ and his wife, whose name is unknown. The will of William Gaylord of Windsor, dated 31 January 1671[2] (with codicils dated 14 November and 18 December 1672), gave to "my son Samuel Gaylord ten rods breadth in the land over the great river."⁴ Samuel's older brother, WILLIAM² GAYLORD (*EF*),⁵ also settled in Windsor, where he was known as William Gaylord the Younger. The surname is also spelled Gaylor, Gayler, Gaylar, Gallerd, Gallard, Gaylard, Gaylerd, Gaylarde.

BIRTH/BAPTISM: Baptized Crewkerne, Somersetshire, England, 19 December 1619.⁶

DEATH/BURIAL: Died Hatfield, Hampshire County, Massachusetts, between 22 September and 25 October 1689, possibly on 27 September 1689.⁷ *SEE COMMENTARY #1.*

MARRIED: 1) Windsor, 4 December 1646.⁸

BRIDE: ELIZABETH HULL.

PARENTAGE/FAMILY: Daughter of GEORGE and first wife TAMZEN/THOMASIN/THOMASINE (MICHELL/MITCHELL) HULL (*GMB*).⁹ George and Tamzen came to New England in 1632 with six children: Josias, age 16, Mary, age 14, Martha age 12, Elizabeth age 7, Cornelius, age 4, and Naomi, say under age 1 or in utero.¹⁰ The family removed to Windsor in 1636 and then to Fairfield, Connecticut, in 1647.¹¹ The will of George Hull, of Fairfield, proved 20 October 1659, left the residue of his estate to his four daughters, Mary, Martha, Elizabeth, and Naomy, without giving their married names.¹²

Calendar Old Style-New Style, Julian & Georgian⁹

The old calendar used up to about 1752 in Protestant countries was the Julian Calendar based on 365.25 days. In 1582 Great Britain and empire switched to the Julian Calendar and since the actual year is 365.2422 days long the switch over caused a 11 day out of synch problem. To solve this problem, it was proclaimed that September 2 would be followed by September 14. As well the old-style calendar the calendar year began on Lady Day 25th of March i.e. the year ran from 25 March to 24 March. Hence January 24, 1712 old-style would-be January 24, 1713 new style. The correct way to describe a date in the “overlap” period from January 1 to March 24 is to state the Old/New Style as 1712 /1713 which means

“January 24, 1712 old style is what we call January 24, 1713”

Also, since the calendar began in March the months if numbered are as follows

- March 1
- April 2
- May 3
- June 4
- July 5
- August 6
- September 7
- October 8
- November 9
- December 10
- January 11
- February 12

The status of freeman was primarily of political importance, for it gave one the right to vote for colony officers. In some colonies, though, freeman was tied to church membership, and so the meaning was somewhat different. Massachusetts Bay and New Haven, the most Puritan of the Puritan colonies, made church membership a prerequisite for foremanship, while the rest of the New England colonies did not.

List of freemen may be used for a number of purposes beyond proving biographical information about an immigrant. Like tax lists later, a list of freeman provides basic information about the presence or absence of a person on a given date. And, as noted above, freemanship in Massachusetts Bay and New Haven supplies information about church membership, from which we can learn not just whether this individual was a church member at a given time; we can also reconstruct some of the history of churches whose records have been lost by studying the lists over a period of years.
